1. **Bestseller** / best' sel.ər/ (noun) a product that is extremely popular and has sold in very large numbers:

E.g.: The "Harry Potter" novels were all bestsellers.

2. **Soldier** / souldʒər/ (noun): a member of the army

E.g.: There are many soldiers guarding the main gate.

3. **Biographies** /baɪ'ɒgrəfi/ (noun); a book that tells what has happened in someone's life

E.g.: Biography of Samuel Johnson

4. **Prison** / prɪz.ən/ (noun): a building where criminals are forced to live as a punishment:

E.g.: Conditions in the prison are said to be appalling.

5. **Novel** / nəʊvəl / (noun): a long story

E.g.: a novel by Jane Austen.

6. **Published** /'pʌb.lɪʃ/ (verb): to make information available to people, especially in a book, magazine, or newspaper, or to produce and sell a book, magazine, or newspaper:

E.g.: She's just had an article published in their weekend supplement.

7. **Escape** / ɪ'skeɪp / (verb): to get free from something, or to avoid something:

E.g.: Two prisoners have escaped.

8. **Caretaker** / ker.tər.kər/ (noun): a person employed to take care of a large building, such as a school, and who deals with the cleaning, repairs, etc.

9. **Elevator** / ə'lev.eɪtər/ (noun): A machine that takes people and goods from one level to another in a building SYN Lift

E.g.: We have to take the elevator.

10. **Operator** / ə'.pə.reɪ.tər/ (noun) someone whose job is to use and control a machine or vehicle:

11. **Compose** / kəmpouz/ (verb): To write a piece of music

E.g.: Jack composed a new piece of music.

12. **Invent** / in'vent/ (verb): To make a new thing

E.g.: Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone in 1876.

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13. **Self-portrait** / self' po:r.trɪt/ (noun): a picture, photograph, or piece of writing that you make of or about yourself

14. **Minister** / min.ə.stər/ (noun): a member of the government in Britain and many other countries who is in charge of a particular department or has an important position in it:

E.g.: the foreign/health minister

15. **Mentally** / men.təl.i/ (adverb): connected with or related to the mind:

E.g.: It's going to be a tough competition but I'm mentally prepared for it.

16. **Mental hospital** / men.təl 'ha:.spi.təl/ (noun): a place where people who are mentally ill stay and receive treatment

17. **Famous** / feɪməs/ (adjective): known about by many people in many places

E.g.: A famous actor.

18. **Sunflower** / sʌn'flaʊər/ (noun): a plant, usually having a very tall stem and a single large, round, flat, yellow flower, with many long, thin, narrow petals close together

1. **Celebration** / sel.ə'breɪ.ʃən/ (noun): a special social event, such as a party, when you celebrate something:
E.g.: There were lively New Year celebrations all over town.
2. **Midnight** / mɪdnæt/ (noun): 12 o'clock at **night**
E.g.: The restaurant is open from 5 p.m. to midnight every day.
3. **Realize** / riː.ə.laɪz/ (verb): to understand a situation, sometimes suddenly:
E.g.: They didn't realize the danger they were in.
4. **Fantastic** / fæntæstɪk/ (adjective): Extremely good, attractive, enjoyable
E.g.: You look fantastic!
5. **Strange** / streɪndʒ/ (adjective): Unusual or surprising, SYN odd
E.g.: Strange noises.
6. **Incredible** / in'kredəbəl/ (adjective): Extremely great SYN Unbelievable
E.g.: The view of the sea is incredible.
7. **Planned** / plæn/ (verb): to think about and decide what you are going to do or how you are going to do something:
E.g.: She helped them to plan their route.
8. **Countdown** / kaʊnt.dəʊn/ (noun): the act of counting backwards to zero:
E.g.: The countdown to the rocket launch will begin at 9.00 a.m.

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4. **Decide** /dɪ'saɪd/ (verb): to choose something, especially after thinking carefully about several possibilities:
E.g.: They have to decide by next Friday.
5. **Safely** / seif.li/ (adverb): in a safe way:
E.g.: We all arrived safely.
6. **Land** / lænd/ (verb): to (cause to) arrive on the ground or other surface after moving down through the air:
E.g.: We should land in Madrid at 7 a.m.

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9. **Tradition** / trə'dɪʃ.ən/ (noun):
a belief, principle, or way
of acting that people in
a particular society or group have continued to
follow for a long time, or all of these beliefs,
etc. in a particular society or group:
E.g.: Fireworks have long been an American
tradition on the Fourth of July.

10. **Peace** / pi:s/ (noun):
freedom from war and violence, especially when
people live and work together happily without
disagreements:
E.g.: peace talks/proposals

11. **Atmosphere** / ætməsfɪər/ (noun): The feeling that
an event or place gives you
E.g.: The hotel had a lovely atmosphere.

12. **Firework** / faɪrwɜ:rk/ (noun): A small container
filled with powder that burns or explodes to
produce colored lights and noise in the sky
E.g.: A New Year's Eve fireworks display

1. **Traffic light** (noun): A set of red, yellow, and green lights that control traffic
E.g.: When I wait at the traffic lights, I get angry.
2. **Church** /tʃɜ:rtʃ/ (noun): A building where Christians go to worship
E.g.: Church bells.
3. **Bridge** / brɪdʒ/ (noun): A structure built over a river, road etc that allows people or vehicles to cross from one side to the other.
E.g.: Nature bridge.
4. **Museum** /mju:'ziəm/ (noun): A building where important cultural, historical, or scientific objects are kept and shown to the public
E.g.: The Museum of Modern Art.
5. **Exhibition** /eksɪ'bɪʃən/ (noun): A public showing of art, crafts, products, or skills
E.g.: We will go to the book exhibition today.
